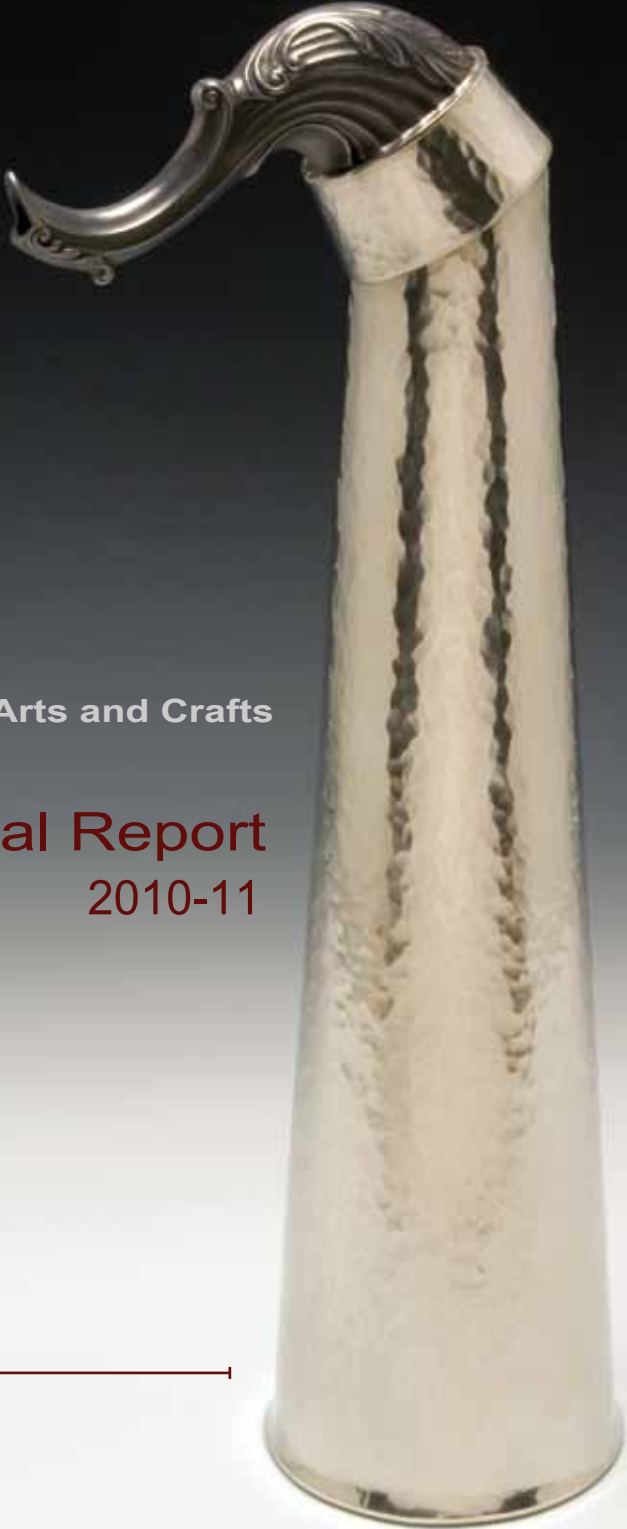

From the Executive Director



As I sat down to write this annual report, I realized that I have been Executive Director of SAC for approximately 15% of its history. For most organizations that might not seem like much - but when you are 114 years old - it is a significant percentage.

It is also significant that we ended the year again with a small surplus. This is due in no small part to the support of our members and donors, the success of our programs, and the hard work of our Board of Directors, Advisory Council, Resource Council, staff and volunteers. In part, the surplus will be used to add a program/marketing staff position for fiscal year 2011-12. This increase will bring our “staff count” back to where we were pre-recession.

Our fiscal year* included programs for artists, students, collectors and the general public. We curated five exhibitions for our gallery, administered a \$25,000 furniture fellowship, distributed \$9,000 in artist grants, produced a 124-page exhibition catalog, organized a tour of artist studios and galleries in New Hampshire, orchestrated two Craftboston shows, and offered a wide range of educational and outreach programs.

In addition to all of our programs, the SAC staff has been actively engaged in and contributing to the craft field through their involvement as conference/workshop participants, teachers, jurors, visiting lecturers and critics at MassArt and RISD. SAC staff participated in the planning committee for the Furniture Society conference at MIT, served on the Lifetime Achievement Award Committee for the Society of North American Goldsmiths, the Advisory Board for the Watershed Center for Ceramic Arts and on the Fuller Craft Museum Collections Committee.

We believe that our combined programs and activities continue to have a significant impact on the contemporary craft community. We value your support and hope you will continue to participate in the future.

Initiated in 1994, the SAC Artist Awards encourage and support the work of New England craft artists who demonstrate a mastery of their media and create original and innovative work. A panel of jurors selected three artists to each receive a \$3,000 cash award. The winners participated in a group exhibition at SAC's Newbury Street gallery from August 28 to October 30, 2010.

Timothy Coleman, one of three winners of the 2010 Artists Awards, makes functional furniture that is elegant and extremely well-crafted. As a twelve year-old he set up his first workshop in his basement while other kids were playing Little League baseball.

A decade later he apprenticed to a master furniture maker in Seattle, then studied for two years with the renowned James Krenov at the College of the Redwoods in California. In 1989, at the age of 28, he established his independent studio in Western Massachusetts where he has been designing and building furniture ever since.

Coleman has worked hard to realize his ambition of becoming a furniture maker, and SAC was pleased to recognize and celebrate his path and the fine work he creates.

The awards were open to craft artists from New England working in clay, fiber, glass, metal, wood, or mixed media. To date, SAC has distributed \$78,000 through this program. The 2010 recipients were: Tim Coleman, furniture, Massachusetts; Ellen Wieske, mixed media, Maine; and Jeffrey Clancy, metals, Maine.

John D. Mineck Furniture Fellowship

The John D. Mineck Furniture Fellowship was created to encourage and support a young in career furniture artist with the financial assistance to help them succeed in their journey. The fellowship, in the amount of \$25,000, is awarded annually and is designed to help support a talented furniture artist looking to fulfill an apprenticeship, develop their own skills, and/or make the transition to independence.

The fellowship is funded by the John D. Mineck Foundation and administered by The Society of Arts and Crafts. Libby Schrum of Maine was selected to receive the 2010 John D. Mineck Furniture Fellowship. Schrum wrote to SAC during her fellowship period to update us on her progress:

“In October, as I held the \$25,000 check from the Mineck Foundation and The Society of Arts and Crafts in my hands, it boggled the mind to imagine how far this funding could take me, in both the literal and figurative sense. As I take a moment to slow down and reflect, I can honestly say this has been the type of career building opportunity for which the Mineck Fellowship was established.

After purchasing all of the tools and accessories, I began to work on my website while finishing up some commission work in anticipation of leaving for a couple of months to go to North Carolina (to Penland). When people ask me about my experience at Penland School of Crafts, I explain by saying what a gift it was and will continue to be. There are very few places where you can shed most of your everyday responsibilities and commitments, wake up each morning and be creative until it's time to eat a meal or go to bed. For me, it was so special to be in an intensive learning environment again and more importantly, to be a student ... It has been an amazing eight months and I am eagerly looking forward to the next four. Thank you again.”

Exhibition Program

SAC curated five exhibitions this year. Our exhibition program focuses primarily, though not exclusively, on the work of contemporary American artists. When developing our curatorial offerings, we believe that it is important and indeed healthy to occasionally look beyond the borders of the United States.

An opportunity arose for SAC to collaborate with Velvet da Vinci gallery in San Francisco to organize the *Pocket Guide to New Zealand Jewelry*, an exhibition of artwork from sixteen of New Zealand's finest contemporary jewelers. This exhibition, curated by Damian Skinner, was loosely based on *The Pocket Guide to New Zealand* issued in 1943 by the United States War and Navy Departments. The guide was distributed to troops stationed in NZ during the war as a descriptive guide to the history, culture, peoples and language of the country. The new guide is intended to introduce American audiences to contemporary New Zealand jewelry.

The exhibition was on view at Velvet da Vinci, SAC, and the Racine Art Museum in Wisconsin. A 124-page color catalog, funded by the Rotasa Foundation, was published in conjunction with the exhibition.

Craftboston

In its ninth year, Craftboston Spring welcomed 200 exhibitors, including sixteen of Israel's top contemporary artists with support from the Association of Israel's Decorative Arts (AIDA). The Israeli artists presented at Craftboston were the largest contingent of artists from any country outside of the United States at the show. Together with AIDA, Craftboston helped to connect artists focused on ingenuity, creativity, and passion with an international audience of galleries, institutions and collectors.

Nirit Dekel, AIDA artist and winner of the Craftboston Jewelry Award of Distinction, creates her work in a traditional lampworking style using Italian Moretti glass at her studio in Tel Aviv. After being swept into a career in one of the largest high-tech firms in Israel, her passion was sparked in 2000 when she visited Chihuly's exhibition at David's Tower in the Old City of Jerusalem. Nirit was instantly magnetized by the glass medium and has followed her passion for art ever since.

Craftboston Spring celebrated the sixth year of the SAC Mentor Program. The program offers assistance and training for emerging artists in marketing, legal and insurance issues, portfolio development, pricing, selling, and booth design. This year's participants were Kirsten Bassion, ceramics; Beth Gaertner, jewelry; Jennaca Leigh Davies, jewelry; Amy Louise Galligan, jewelry; and Jeremy Ogusky, ceramics.

Craftboston Holiday celebrated its third year and showcased 90 artists. Taking place at the Cyclorama at the Boston Center for the Arts, the show has rapidly become a holiday favorite within the South End's culturally rich neighborhood.

For the past decade, Amy Nguyen has been creating wearable art that has been greatly influenced by Japanese textile design, most notably in the art of Shibori. Upon moving to Boston from Brooklyn, New York in 2005, Amy began volunteering at The Society of Arts and Crafts' retail store seeing it as an opportunity to become involved with the local craft community. While working at SAC, Amy began to "develop an ideal of where I wanted to take my work creatively and commercially."

As with intricately folded origami, her process begins with folding or pleating a rectangular piece of white cloth. She stitches and manipulates the fabric throughout the dyeing process until deep, rich color and layers of texture unfold. She is interested in the rhythm and movement of textiles and the way in which a rectangular piece of cloth can be reconfigured to accent the natural curves of the human form in the same way that sleek, modern architecture can highlight a natural landscape.

Amy participated in her first Craftboston in the spring of 2007 and has since become one of the most popular artists in the show. She was recently selected to serve on the jury for the upcoming 2012 Spring and Holiday Craftboston shows. Her exquisite wearable art can be found in galleries, specialty shops, and museum stores around the country and internationally as well as at SAC.

SAC's retail store is located on the first floor at 175 Newbury Street in the historic Back Bay neighborhood of Boston. The retail store represents over 250+ artists from across the United States. All work is selected by the SAC retail jury and profits directly support the artists and a range of SAC programming.

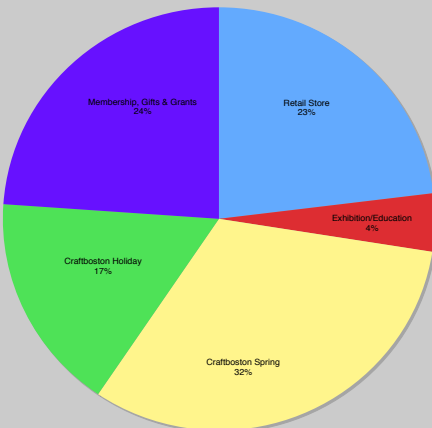
STATEMENT OF ACTIVITY

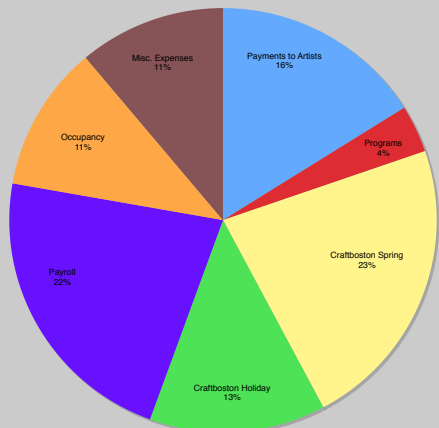

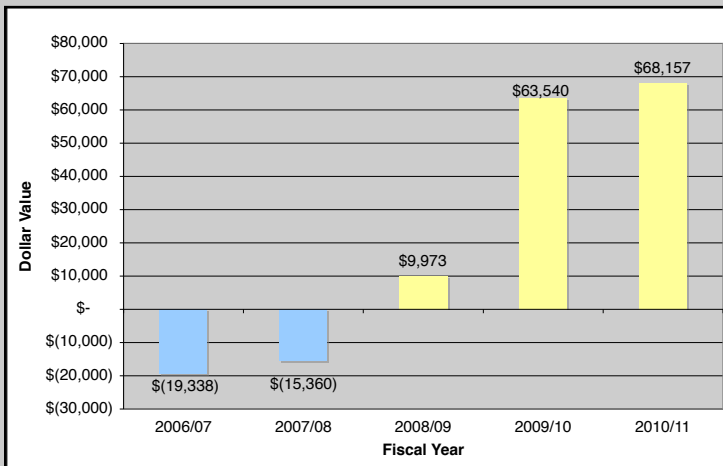
